NORTHSIDE ELEMENTARY

The students at Northside Elementary are on a mission to achieve individual goals. Part of that process includes setting reading goals in Accelerated Reader. With teacher guidance, each student determines the total number of points he/she will attain by the end of the nine weeks. These goals are based on students' reading levels and prior successes. Teachers also meet with students on a regular basis to determine other goals that may include academics,



behavior, or personal goals. For the second nine weeks, all students have been challenged to attain one of three specific goals: perfect attendance, honor roll, or improving one subject by a letter grade. Anyone achieving one of these three will be rewarded with popcorn and a movie sponsored by the Northside Parent Teacher/Student Organization (PTSO). The students at Northside are well on their way to accomplishing their mission!

PEARL UPPER SCHOOL GRADES 4-5

ELECTION PROCESS

In an effort to encourage Pearl Upper students to become lifelong learners, achieve individual goals, and positively impact a global society, fourth and fifth grade students were given the opportunity to become involved in a unit of study on civic responsibility by participating in a simulation of the campaign and election process. With our country in the midst of the 2008 Presidential election, Upper chose to take advantage of a teachable moment, but with a little bit of a different twist. They decided that it was time for a kid to run for president! Knowing that many people in the United States have very little knowledge of the complexities of campaigning for public office, the purpose of this simulation was to give students the experience of working within the political process and to help them understand the many dimensions of that process and what is needed to manage a political campaign. Students were randomly placed on several campaign staffs, and one name was drawn to be each group's presidential nominee. These groups were given guidelines to let them know everything that their staff had to do in order to earn points (instead of votes) towards being elected to the presidency. Each staff had to come up with a name, symbol, and slogan for their political party, and they had to nominate and vote on a famous person or character to be the vice presidential nominee for their party. They were asked to do many of the things that a real campaign staff has to do when running a candidate for public office. Some of these activities included deciding on important issues, creating television commercials, writing newspaper articles, writing and giving speeches, planning fundraising events, and designing bumper stickers, tshirts and yard signs. Along this path to the presidency, students had the chance to compete individually in two competitions.

EXTREME WHITE HOUSE MAKEOVER

In the *Extreme White House Makeover*, students created their own original version of the White House. In addition, students came up with new names for the residence.

WHITE HOUSE CHINA CONTEST

For the second competition, students designed their own new pattern of presidential china. Students voted on their favorite designs.

VICTORY PARTY

Every campaign staff has a victory party on election night, so the culmination of Upper's election study was a celebration which included watching videos of the commercials and speeches made by the students. Each student was awarded a certificate for completing the unit of study, and winners of several competitions were announced. Certificates were presented by Jordan Downs, a Pearl High School graduate and former Quest student, who recently received a Political Science degree from the University of Mississippi. Jordan spoke to the students about his experiences working on a real campaign staff and encouraged them to become involved in our country's election process at a young age. Parents and friends from the community were invited to attend, and refreshments were served.



PEARL UPPER SCHOOL GRADES 6-8

Pearl Upper School 6-8 is working hard to ensure that their students are adhering to the mission statement and core values. The students are encouraged to participate in schoolwide activities such as the canned food drive, character bandaid drive, and other opportunities to serve their community. The teachers also participate modeling school and community spirit. This affords the students the opportunity to learn the rewards of making a positive impact on our community through personal experience.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Students are led to engage in learning activities with other students in small groups. They are taught responsibility for keeping a set of notes and handouts for each unit. The teachers attended the MS Science Teachers' Association Conference this past fall. Teachers participated in workshops that offered the opportunity to experience inquiry-based and hands-on activities from the students' point of view. Teachers returned to the class with a renewed spirit and new ideas to share with students.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

Teachers are determined to create and inspire young writers and to foster a genuine love of reading. They do this by creating a safe environment where students are not afraid to take risks. Teachers work together to create writing workshops that focus on the students' strengths while working to correct weaknesses. These activities are creating lifelong learners.

SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT

Congressman Gregg Harper came to speak to the 8th grade about the orientation he is going though in preparation of taking his seat in the U.S. Congress. The students saw firsthand how lifelong learning is an integral part of personal fulfillment. The students also presented Mr. Harper with a proposal for a bill that they would like to see proposed in the U.S. Congress. The Junior Historical

Society's participation in the Pearl Christmas Parade was a way for the students to contribute positively to community. The



theme of the float was "Christmas Around The World". Students researched Christmas traditions of various countries around the world and then displayed their findings on the float to share with the community.



SPECIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Students wrote holiday stories (fiction and nonfiction) to share with Pre-K students. Students were excited about their work and believe that their stories brought joy to others. Students are learning daily about role models and how they have impacted society through the "Every-Day Edits" grammar lessons. They have learned about Eleanor Roosevelt, Maya Angelou, Abraham Lincoln, Rosa Parks and many others. This department is declaring to work with each student so that they are "freeing the power" to enrich the community and their individuality.

Upcoming activities include building "toothpick bridges", creating unique chess boards, and participating in a chess tournament.

The 4th and 5th grade Quest students will soon be setting up a "Mini Society", using a curriculum created by the Kauffman Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership. The curriculum is an experience-based approach to teaching students entrepreneurship and economic concepts through the creation of their own society. It will bring



real-life business and economics into the class, prepare students for earning and using money wisely, and lay a foundation for entrepreneurship. These classes hope to involve community

leaders/parents by having them talk to the students about their jobs.

Drama Department
