Art Department

Five art students and their art teachers at Pearl High School were recognized on the state and national levels in January-March of 2009 through the Scholastic Art Competition at the Mississippi Museum of Art in Jackson. In Category II (grades 10-12) on a statewide level, Joe Hennessey (Clay Mask), Kimberly Goldberg (Batik), and J. T. Griffith (Batik) were all given Silver Key Awards for their artwork. Brad Chambers received a Certificate of Merit, also for a Batik. All were students of Mrs. Vicky Miley. In Category I (grade nine) two students received Gold Keys, and their work went on to compete in New York on a national level. Dylan Sanchez created a Pastel drawing (student of Felicia Lee) and Jorge Reyes created a pastel painting (student of Rebecca Wilkinson). A ceremony was held at the MMA, and all five students' art was on display at the museum for two months (February-March).

The National Art Honor Society

went on a field trip to the Ogden Museum of Southern Art in New Orleans,



Louisiana, where they saw the largest collection of southern art in the United States. They also toured local galleries and saw a variety of art media from local, regional and national artists.

Mayor Jimmy Foster proclaimed March as Youth Art Month in Pearl. All seven art teachers in the Pearl Public School District and students from each school met the Mayor at City Hall for this proclamation. The first annual Pearl Public School District Art Show was displayed at the Pearl Public Library for the month of March. Over 250 works of art were displayed from all of the schools in the district. A well-received reception for the public was held on March 10. Friends of the Library and local businesses provided a reception for students, families and friends. PHS Chamber Singers presented a memorable concert during the reception. The art teachers are Nancy Head, Lower Elementary; Rebecca Self, Northside; Kim Saxton and Donnis Simmons, Pearl Junior High; Vicky Miley, Rebecca Wilkinson, and Felicia Lee, PHS.

Six art students won a school-wide art competition for the Google Logo design to represent Pearl High School for region seven in a national competition. Three Pearl High School Art students won the Mississippi Statewide Law Day Art Competition, and their artwork was displayed at the Capital in Jackson. Dylan Lawson won first place for 12th grade; Stephen Wells won second place for 11th grade; and Jessica Pickett won second place for 10th grade. Their art was designed to celebrate the theme "Legacy for Liberty, Abraham Lincoln" and will be printed in the Mississippi Law Magazine in June of 2009.

Drama Department

The combined choral and drama students presented "Children of Eden" as the spring musical. Dayle Watts, a former Singers' parent, joined the cast as "Father." This is the first time that an adult from the community, other than faculty members, has participated in our musicals.

Drama II performed a children's play called Rutherford Wolf at Northside Elementary. Thespians attended State Thespian conference where several students received superiors for their individual performances, and the "One Act Play" placed second. Marie Adkinson, Cesar Munoz, Megan Poole and Erick Weeks will be performing his/her individual performances at International Thespian Conference in Lincoln, Nebraska, this summer. Drama III/IV held "A Night of One Acts" where all three plays were directed by students. Drama I students built models of a set they designed for a one act play and wrote their own short plays.

Band Department

The Seventh Grade Band, Varsity Band and Concert Band participated in the South Mississippi Band Festival at Jones County Junior College where they received all superior concert and sight reading ratings.

The Varsity, Concert and Symphonic Bands attended the State Concert Band Festival at Pearl High School. Varsity received excellent ratings in concert and sight reading. Both Concert and Symphonic Bands received all superior ratings

Indoor Percussion competed at the Winter Guard International South Percussion Regional in Pensacola, Florida. They won the Percussion Scholastic A Class at the Mississippi Indoor Association Championships.

Choral Department

This was an honor, and Singers were well received by musicians from around the state. Participation in this event was important for students in Pearl Singers and contributed to their efforts to achieve individual goals and positively impact a global society.

Music Educators Association and American Choral Directors Association honor choirs that took place at the state music convention. These students obtained individual goals through participation in these events.

The semester ended with concerts given by all choral groups, including performances at PTSO meetings at the elementary schools.

Dance Department

The mission of Pearl Public School District is to prepare each student to become a lifelong learner, achieve individual goals, and positively impact a global society. In an effort to ensure that the dance class is adhering to the mission statement, the dance team viewed the movie, "C Me Dance." The plot of this thrilling movie involves a young ballet dancer who, despite great adversity, finds the courage to stand strong against evil, faithfully serve God and use the gifts He has given her for His glory. Following the viewing of the movie, each dancer wrote an essay that has been entered into an essay contest being sponsored by the company that produced the film. In the essay, students told how the theme of the movie relates to their own beliefs and experiences and made a connection between the theme of the movie to a specific personal experience they have had in their own life. Gift cards in the amount of \$200 will be awarded to the top 20 winners. There will be two grand prize winners who will receive \$2,000 to be

awarded to their chosen private or public organization, and \$5,000 will be donated to the Leukemia Foundation on the student's behalf.

Through their participation, each dancer was encouraged to achieve her individual goals by watching the film that focuses on the life of "Sheri," a teenage girl who has trained her entire life to dance for the Pittsburgh Ballet. Dancers were also encouraged to become lifelong learners by using a non-traditional learning experience - viewing a movie - to learn more about the art of dance and the accompanying essay contest to practice writing skills they have acquired in their English classes and that are part of the Subject Area Test in English II. The learning experience was also interdisciplinary in that they were asked to have their English teachers proofread their essay before turning them in. Finally, dancers' entries into the essay contest contributed positively to a global society. They learned that indirect activities such as entering an essay contest can allow them to earn money to support benevolent organizations such as the Leukemia Foundation, which is the only national organization dedicated to the care and cure of patients and families living with leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma and related blood disorders

Northside Elementary

In February, the third-grade students read stories about horses and the old west. The students studied vocabulary terms from



an old boom town. The historical fiction book, *Boom Town*, described how members of the community positively helped their community to survive. People used skills that they did best to help their community. The third-grade

As part of the school's mission to positively impact a global society, students and staff at Pearl Upper School (Grades 4-5) went "green" this spring! During the months of March and April, students participated in a variety of activities.



In the library, students listened to the book *A River Ran Wild* by Lynne Cherry. This book is an environmental history of the Nashua River, from its discovery by Indians through the polluting years

of the Industrial Revolution to the ambitious cleanup that revitalized it. In April, National Poetry Month, Mrs. Burns, Pearl Upper Library Media Specialist, read the poem "Sarah Cynthia Sylvia Stout" from the book *Where the Sidewalk Ends* by Shel Silverstein to increase awareness of how much garbage we produce.

Science teacher Judy Young coordinated with the Pearl Urban Forestry Board, Keep Pearl Beautiful, Pearl Chamber of Commerce, Pearl Kiwanis Club, and the Mississippi DepartmentofEnvironmental



Quality to present an Arbor Day environmental puppet musical to educate students about the importance of trees in an urban setting. Mrs. Young also collaborated with Keep Pearl Beautiful and Wal-mart to organize Pearl Upper's first recycling program. Students and teachers have been recycling paper, plastic, cardboard and other items from school and home since the beginning of the school year. Darlene Slater with Keep Pearl Beautiful says that the Upper Elementary has collected over five tons of recycled material since the program's inception. Keep Pearl Beautiful also sponsored the *Great American Cleanup Campaign* by providing students with gloves and trash bags during the week of Earth Day. Students participated by picking up trash in different areas of the school's campus. Students gained ownership in taking care of the environment. For the *Great American Cleanup Campaign*, the Mississippi Department of Transportation also

Upon completion of the "green" unit, students were encouraged to set individual goals at home by spending less time playing video games or watching television and more time outside in nature.

All special services teachers attended a workshop in the district for Extended School Year Services. Special services teachers also attended a half-day training in the area of Individualized Education Program (IEP) Development.

An assistive technology team from the T. K. Martin Center for Technology and Disability evaluated several students in the district to recommend devices and services to help students progress on the goals and objectives outlined in their Individualized Education Program.

Positively Impacting a Global Society

An Orientation and Mobility consultant provided training to personnel working with visually impaired students to help students develop skills and techniques necessary for a person with a visual impairment to travel safely, efficiently and gracefully through his/her environment and under all environmental conditions and situations. The PPSD Visually Impaired consultant held a training for P.E. and Special Services staff on how visual impairments affect participation in P.E. Class and how a visually impaired student learns differently from a sight student.

The Special Services Staff also provided staff development to district staff in the area of Least Restrictive Environment to ensure that students with disabilities are participating to the maximum extent appropriate in the regular education environment. Ongoing staff development in this area for all Pearl Public School District Staff will be implemented throughout next school year.
