A Community Comes Together to Serve Others

Each year as football rivalries meet, the Mississippi Food Network looks for donations from local communities to help them stock their food pantries to serve families in need across the state. A competition to collect the most canned goods was held between the communities

of the rival schools statewide. This year as the *Fighting Pirates* readied themselves for what would later become a victory on the gridiron, the schools in Pearl focused on collecting food items for the needy. Students enlisted the aid of the community to help collect an unprecedented amount of food. A record-setting 100,964 food items were collected by Pearl, demonstrating the communities strong spirit of giving.

Although these food items were collected in a short amount of time, the impact lasted much longer. Pearl High School, aided by the entire community of Pearl, collected more food items for this food drive than any other school in the state. The benefits of this competition were reaped not only by the community, but also by the families served through the Mississippi Food Network.

What began as a PHS Student Council competition during Spirit Week grew into a community-wide service project. This event is just one of the many examples of the community and schools in Pearl working together to positively impact the lives of others.

Support Services...

Parents As Teachers Program: The early years of a child's life are critical for optimal development and provide the foundation for success in school and in life. Parents are their children's first and most influential teachers. At PTCRC, we use a nationally recognized curriculum for parents with children, ages prenatal to Kindergarten entry. This



Parents As Teachers curriculum is used to help parents enhance the healthy development of their children. PTCRC's educators families provide with developmental information, materials, and support needed to

help their child develop optimally. Thirty minute sessions occur in the family's home or at PTCRC bimonthly.

Teacher Prescription Program: This program is utilized when additional practice is needed at home. First, a teacher writes a specific skill on a PTCRC Teacher Prescription. The prescription is then sent home with the student. Next, the parent brings the prescription to the Pearl Parent Teacher Community Resource Center (PTCRC). Last, a PTCRC



Lending Library: This area contains an array of educational materials. Parents, community members, and teachers may access and check out items, free of charge, on a weekly basis.

S.P.A.R.K. office: Located in

Suite C, S.P.A.R.K. representatives work with communities, schools, state agencies, and families to create a seamless transition into school to ensure that children are ready for school and schools are ready for children.

MSCCR&R office: Located in Suite C, representatives provide training opportunities and a lending library for residents of Hinds County, Madison County, Rankin County, and Yazoo County.

Integrating Technology

Technology is being used to strengthen and enhance learning at PJH in a variety of ways. The history department is using interactive whiteboard technology to take virtual field trips such as touring the Notre Dame Cathedral. The eighth grade math department and computer discovery departments have worked collaboratively so students can reinforce their skills with Microsoft Excel to represent surveys graphically. The computer discovery students are also using their technology training to create a class newspaper that includes news, sports, and lifestyle sections. Creation of these newspapers will be enhanced through participation in numerous writing workshops conducted by the 7th grade English department.

A computer-based learning program to improve reading skills is being used in grades 6 through 8. This program is used in conjunction with intensive classroom instruction on students' instructional levels to make significant improvement in reading fluency.

The career discovery department held a Career Day for 7th grade students to allow them to gain insight into some possible professions they may choose in the future. Also, in preparation for future

careers, a new technology curriculum will be introduced at PJH next year. Information and Communication Technology (ICT) will allow us to better prepare students to further their education and be better prepared to enter the workforce.

Goal-Oriented Students

Students set academic and community service goals. All students at PJH have been involved in activities to help improve scores on the upcoming MCT2. However, the Algebra I students have set a goal for all advanced scores on both the MCT2 and the Algebra I Subject Area Test. To meet this goal, these students are participating in practice/help sessions. Student members of MathCounts completed their annual community service project by



collecting breakfast bars for Blair E. Batson Children's Hospital. Those students delivering the bars were given a tour of the facility by Dr. Betsy Herrington, Director of Pediatric Neuro-Oncology and a Pearl graduate.

Newly-Formed Science Fair Club

PJH formed a Science Fair Club this year, having met the requirements, they participated in the MSEF Region II Science Fair held at Jackson State University in March. Students have investigated things such as Charles' Law, geotropism, and using vegetables and



fruits as batteries. Their projects will be part of over 500 projects on display for the competition.



Special Services Teachers Provide Instruction for All

Students in general education classes reap the benefits of an additional instructor in some classes. Special services teachers serving as co-teachers are available to support instruction for all students through

the use of small groups,

additional strategies for learning and organizing materials, and an additional source of knowledge.

Extracurricular Activities

Both the choral music and band programs have been successful in competitions this year. The 8th grade football team finished 3rd in the Little 6 Conference with a 6 and 2 record. Both the boys and girls

8th grade track teams ended their seasons second in the Little 6, while the 7th grade boys and girls teams boasted undefeated records. PJH basketball teams were also successful, with the 8th grade boys team finishing 2nd in the Little 6. Construction on a new gymnasium will

not only improve the facilities for athletic teams, but it will also aid in enhancing the physical education program offered at PJH. Ground breaking is scheduled for this summer.

Creative Curriculum

Pearl High School is continually updating curriculum offerings to best meet the changing needs of students. This year, students were provided the tuitionfree opportunity to enroll in six different college courses taught by PHS staff on our campus. Through this partnership with Hinds Community College, students can

leave Pearl High School with a full semester of college coursework completed. Plans are currently in place to add more college course opportunities in the near future. Students were also given the opportunity this year to take double block math and English courses, giving them a chance to earn math or English credits in one school year. In addition to these new offerings, photography was also added to the fine arts curriculum. Course offerings in broadcasting and the return of French and French II to the curriculum are in the plans for the next school year.

PHS Enforces No Child Left **Behind Legislation in Creative Ways**

Pearl High School is enforcing the No Child Left Behind federal legislation through use of an intervention program. The emphasis of intervention is on catching students before they fail.

Students who are at risk of failing or dropping out are placed in what is called "Tier 3" intervention classes with Mrs. Anne Edwards. The program typically involves a 3 to 1 student/teacher ratio allowing for intense tutoring time. Mrs. Edwards works directly with classroom teachers in order to guide students and assess student progress on necessary skill sets. "Once they can grasp these skill sets, they can be successful in high school and reach graduation. That's the goal!" commented Mrs. Edwards.

There are situations when students are struggling and need more instruction than intervention can provide. These students are referred for more academic testing by the school psychologist. Some students choose the GED route and intervention is the first step in assessing eligibility for the PHS Day GED program. "No matter what, we want students to be successful in life," said Mrs. Edwards, "like our mission statement says, we want students to achieve individual goals and eventually impact a global society. That's what interventionists from kindergarten through high school are all about."



Quiz Bowl Team Competes

The Pearl High School Quiz Bowl Team offers students an opportunity to use the knowledge they've learned in extracurricular competitions. This year's team of Aaron Stewart, Jayce O'Shields, Rav Singh, Jimmy Bailey, Thomas Manchester, and Drew LaFontaine competed in several tournaments. Among

these tournaments were the Madison Central Invitational and the Mississippi College Academic Competition. In both tournaments, the team advanced to the semifinals. On April 2nd, the Quiz Bowl team participated in the state tournament held at St. Andrew's High School.

Community Volunteers Help Freshmen Get a Glimpse of the Real World

To help students understand the economic value of a high school diploma, PHS held its 3rd annual Reality Fair

> for Freshmen. More than 250 students and 35 teachers and community volunteers participated.

Prior to the event, students selected a career path with an entry-level salary. Good grades or extracurricular participation provided students with better salaries. At the fair, students visited tables where they paid

monthly living expenses including housing, transportation, insurance, groceries, child care, and unexpected events. Financial advice and supplemental income tables were provided for students who did not earn enough to pay their expenses.

This real world simulation provided a fun learning experience that prepares students to become lifelong learners, achieve individual goals, and positively impact a global society. Local business volunteers and teachers guided students in making choices.
