



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Modern-Day Gladiator







Gleeks Rule!



This year, the team has many veteran runners, many of these have won All-Stars and State Champions. This means that the runners have some pressure on them though.



"I love the game of softball and I love to teach and be with kids. I want to make a difference," Purnell claimed.


In Purnell's opinion, the team's biggest strength is a good bit of experience and a lot of hard work.

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From Iguanas to Squirrels



Full back #49 Ben Hodges is not your ordinary jock. Besides being a football player, Ben also likes to act.


He decided he had a passion for acting at the age of ten when he wrote a play with his cousins.
