



"Doing this project made me feel good because I gave back to the community," said junior Cody McKay.

Anyone can make a difference. Mrs. Mickie West, a teacher at Pearl High School, is making a difference by moving to Haiti with her family to help better a community. For the past six years, Mrs. West has taught Senior English, Junior Honors English, and served as yearbook advisor.

Since going on her first mission trip in high school, Mrs. West has been on six mission trips in the United States, Brazil, Mexico, Bermuda, Canada, and Haiti. She said, "Loving people and showing them that God's love reaches beyond borders and language barriers are my favorite parts of the mission trips. I am happy to be a vehicle He uses to provide that for people."

For several years, Mrs. West has felt ready to go on a mission trip such as this one. After a devastating earthquake hit Haiti on January 12, 2010, her husband, Tony, a registered nurse who also holds a degree in hospital administration, told her that he wanted to go help. He went to Haiti four times that year. When he left Haiti in April, a couple tried to give him their baby to take back to the U.S. with him; he said no with a broken heart. He couldn't stop thinking about the baby. One night he woke out of a deep sleep; he told his wife that God had said to him, "What good would it do the children of Haiti to adopt just one?" In his dream he had seen a medical clinic, a church, a school, and an orphanage.

West's pastor introduced him to Barbara Gladney, mission team coordinator for Project Haiti at First Baptist Church of Jackson. After West told her about his dream, Gladney showed him two pieces of paper with drawings of the buildings exactly as he had described. So the West family is going to go and help the community. "We will be there until God decides our work is complete," said Mrs. West.

Mrs. West's two sons took the news of moving to Haiti surprisingly well, although there are times when leaving gets a little intimidating. Their oldest son, Jonathan, will be staying in Mississippi to finish college. Jacob, a sophomore in high school, is going with them. Mrs. West will homeschool him. They will have Internet so they will use Skype, Facebook and e-mail to stay in touch with their friends and family. While living in Haiti, the family will not have conveniences such as, grocery stores, English television, soft drinks, and many of their favorite foods. Mrs. West said she is going to miss her oldest son, family, and her church the most.

"People sometimes cannot believe we are actually doing this, but I want them to understand that it's God that is doing this." Mrs. West said, "Only God can change a heart. Only God can put a desire so strong in a person's heart that he or she is willing to give up everything to share His love in a third- world country... and be excited about it!! Only God."
