


Summers still likes to have a good time, whether that is playing more sports; hanging out with his family, friends, and girlfriend; or just going to the church youth group.

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College Style Art: High School Course

Pearl High School offers many art classes to its students. These classes range from visual art studios, which is a class that gives an overview of ancient art, all the way to specialized classes for qualified art students.

One specialized art class offered at PHS is the semester-long Drawing Studio. In drawing, advanced art students who have taken lower level arts and meet the specific requirements of the class learn more about drawing. These students also develop their technique based on their individual style and current interest.

Unlike most art classes, drawing is an individual college-style class where the first nine weeks is spent reviewing drawing styles and techniques and also refining their skills. The second nine weeks is a more independent study where the students decide what direction they want to go with their drawing. Mrs. Heather Rumfelt, who teaches the class, then gives the student advice while they complete their project.







Ever wonder if anyone truly cares? If anyone out there in this cruel world would ever truly listen? To help? Maybe you're just not looking close enough. Pearl High School is one of the four hundred subscribers to AnComm, a way for students to anonymously communicate with counselors and administrators at the high school.

Pearl High started using AnComm approximately four years ago, as "a way for students to break the ice and get their concerns heard" as Mrs. Tiffany Durr, counselor, put it. The first year PHS had AnComm, counselors and administrators received quite a few inquiries from students; however, lately, not very many. Counselors Mrs. Becky Rowan and Mrs. Durr, both agree students should hear more about AnComm.

Many students have taken their time during the rush of changing classes to notice and read AnComm's "Talk About it" poster. "Talk about it" is the nation's first and only anonymous online and text based reporting and emergency notification service.

"The counselors have done more individual counseling this year than they have done in years past. It does take time on the counselors' part, but AnComm is another outlet by which kids can communicate. That makes it a positive," posted Ray Morgigno on AnComm's website.

Stress, bullying, and depression ranked in the top three highest-known incidents as reported by elementary, middle and high schools.

The number of incidents involving stress is higher in students than most. Bullying is another problem at most schools. Unfortunately there are few antidotes for dealing with stress, however bullying is something one could try putting a stop to.

Almost 77% of students have been bullied, verbally, mentally, and physically. School Nurse, Mrs. Bonnie DeSalvo states "If you witness bullying, you should definitely say its wrong, stand up, and immediately notify an administrator. Bullying is not a good behavior and should not be tolerated. We as a group should let it be known it's bad. Everyone should step forward in this case."

Depression is a main cause for suicide. Most people look down on depression as just another student trying to get attention. But depression is a serious condition. A person with depression has uncontrollable mood swings in which they feel all the bad emotions (sadness, anxiety, emptiness, hopelessness, worthlessness, etc.) and none of the good.

According to AnComm's website, suicide is the third leading cause of death for 15-24 year olds, and the sixth leading cause of death for 5-14 year olds. "That's ridiculous. That should be stopped. That blows my mind. How bad can a five year olds life be for that to happen. That's horrible," said Junior Kendall Coleman.

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
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
